## NASCIC Invited to Partner with FDA

The FDA division of the Center for Device and Radiological Health (CDRH) hosted their first Patient Engagement Town Hall meeting to kick-off the Patient & Caregiver Connection Program (PCC). NASCIC was one of fourteen organizations invited to be involved with the pilot program. During this test phase, we will work with the PCC program to help the program evolve to include more patient organizations.

Jeff Shuren, CDRH Center Director, introduced this meeting with opening remarks highlighting that safety & efficacy go hand-in-hand with technology innovation. *"They are a ying & yang,"* he described as patients need to be involved in the entire process. The Patient Preference Initiative began at CDRH around 2011 when the Center began studying patient benefit versus risk determinations. Five years later in 2016, the PCC became part of a strategic initiative to include increased transparency with the patient populations and a goal for 90% of the CDRH staff to directly interact with the patient populations that they cover.

Shuren also introduced two key recent activities. One is the creation of the Patient Advisory Committee which brings expertise from patient advocacy groups to advise CDRH. The first meeting was held in October 2017. Draft guidance on patient engagement with the FDA-CDRH will be issued by the end of 2019 for public comment. The second is the commencement of the PCC program. *"These efforts help us to understand the needs, wants, and desires of our primary customer,"* concluded Shuren.

The PCC was formed as an intentional and meaningful interaction with the patient population and the program is housed in the Office of Strategic Partnerships and Technology Innovation (OST). There are 3 goals to gain an understanding of:

- living with a specific disease or condition
- how medical devices are used for diagnosis, treatment, or management of a patient's disease or condition, and
- current issues or trends related to medical devices.

The operation of the program is a simple feedback loop between PCC and the involved organizations. The OST contacts the PCC representatives with areas that need a greater understanding, then CDRH will issue key questions to the involved organization. These questions are disseminated to their constituents to gain feedback and the results and ancillary commentary is looped back to CDRH.

During the PCC kick-off meeting, each of the 14 organizations gave a 3-minute introduction along with participating in panel discussions from the audience. The lunch hour was open for a town hall interaction with representatives from a variety of offices within CDRH including review and compliance officers, research affiliates, and policy administrators. This is a step in the right direction to have our voice heard within the FDA and to engage with them directly. The NASCIC liaison will be Jen French and will report periodically on updates from the FDA and active communications with the agency.
